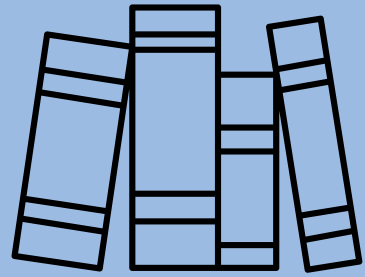




HOW TO HOMESCHOOL AS A MINIMALIST

No stockpiling. Purchase intentionally.

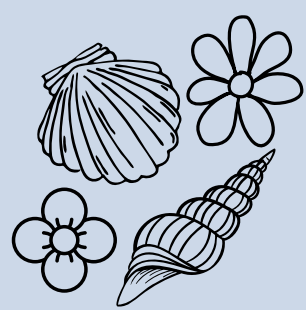

Maximize fun, minimize clutter.

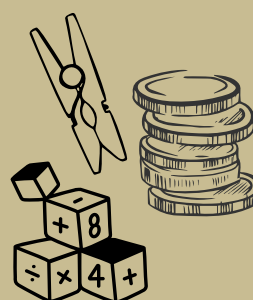

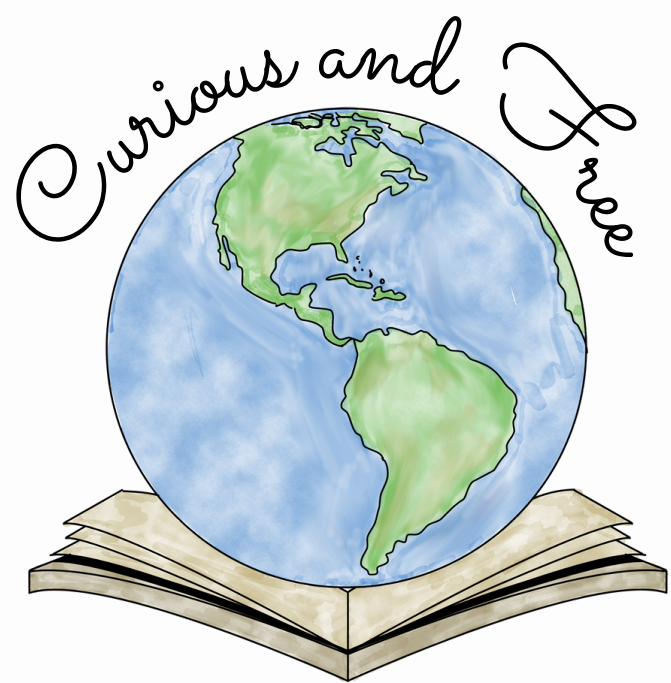
Use What You Already Have

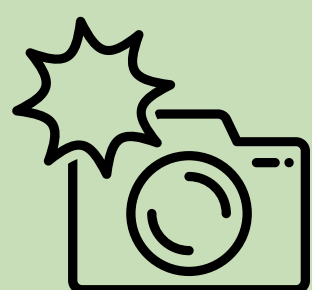
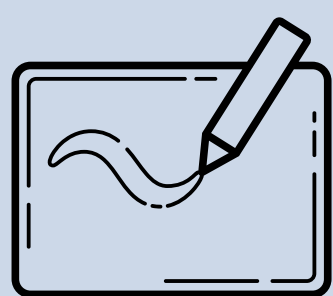


Photo & Recycle
